National Child Protection Week (NCPW) invites all Australians to play their part to promote the safety and wellbeing of children and young people.

In 2023, NCPW is centred around the theme, 'Where we start matters. *Where we start* our lives in terms of where we live, the resources available to us, and the opportunities presented to us make a significant difference to our life outcomes. *Where we start* as a service sector in offering children and their families support and assistance makes a significant difference to life outcomes. *Where we start* as decision makers in addressing large complex policy problems such as child abuse and neglect, also has a significant personal, social and economic outcome.

We can stop child abuse and neglect – and reduce its impact – by working together to make sure every child in every community has a fair go. The Office of Safeguarding is the organisational expression of the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle's abiding commitment to promote the safeguarding of children and vulnerable persons, working closely with the Diocese's parishes, schools, social services, early education and out-of-school hour care programs.

This NCPW, we will be looking at what children are telling us, what families are telling us, what the evidence is telling us, and how to translate this knowledge into action.

We know that too many children are not growing up safe and supported and that child protection systems are overloaded. There are many opportunities to change the trajectory for these children.

 Put some tips in your school newsletter / Compass platform.

For example: Talking with our children about their friendships, fears and joys not only allows us to build strong connections with them but it allows us as parents to make a significant difference in their lives. *Where we start matters.*

- Tips to start meaningful conversations with your children include:
 - What are two great things that happened to you today?
 - What did your friends do today that made you feel happy?
 - What do you think it means to be safe?
 - Where do you feel safest?
 - What are you most proud of?
 - What activity do you enjoy doing? What do you like about that activity?
- Successful communication with your child depends on what, how, when, where and why you say things. What you don't say is also important!
